Christmas tree legends


Legend says that one Christmas Eve, in a forest in Germany, a poor forester and his family huddled by their log fire, trying to stay warm. A small boy, bitterly cold, alone and lost, knocked at their front door. There was very little to spare, but the family made space beside the fire as the child gulped down a bowl of hot broth. Soon it was bedtime. Very early next morning, Christmas Day, singing angels woke the family from their sleep. They then

discovered that their young visitor was the Boy Jesus. In thanks for their hospitality, Jesus gave the forester and his family a freshly cut branch from a fir tree – and thus began the custom of having a Christmas tree in the home.

Another legend tells that the Boy Jesus found a poor family who could not afford to decorate their Christmas tree. He solved their problem by taking some spiders' webs and changing them into silver thread – the first tinsel.
